New Year's Eve NEW YORK:

The world will be watching as the ball drops in Times Square. It is one of the most famous celebrations, and certainly one of the coldest. In this case, you probably will be happy to be snug in your home watching on television or the Internet.

If you're going, get there early because the streets start closing around 6 p.m. as thousands flock to party central to wait for the 1,070-pound ball to drop. It is covered with 504 Waterford crystal triangles, which this year have been engraved with the names of those lost in the World Trade Center attacks. New Year's Eve MIAMI:

Miami's New Year's Eve icon, the "Big Orange," will rise up the side of The Hotel Intercontinental as people count down to midnight at Bayfront Park. The French Quarter is the place to be in New Orleans as thousands pack the streets to welcome the new year. This year local musicians will gather at a stage in Jackson Square on Decatur Street for the "New" New Orleans New Year's Eve Celebration, presented by the Crescent City Countdown Club.

New Year's Eve RIO

More than 2.5 million people will crowd Copacabana in Rio this New Year's Eve. The number will be matched at the other beaches as people celebrate in carnival-like style.

The fireworks won't be the only things illuminating the beaches. Thousands of candles will line the beaches as Christian and Afro-Brazilian religions mix, and all gather to make promises and offerings for the new year.
